IPSC President Mr. Vitaly Kryuchin,

Dear Regional Directors and Delegates,
Dear Executive Council Members and Guests,
Dear Friends,

It is a great pleasure to speak to you again. Every year our Confederation becomes stronger, more experienced and more united. I am proud of the work we have completed together during these years and I thank all of you for your dedication — to the Sport, to your Regions, and to IPSC values.

During the past season, we continued expanding our activities. We welcomed new Regions and we supported the development of all our Disciplines. More people are joining our sport, including many juniors. This is a very good sign for our long-term future. Juniors bring new energy with them and help build a positive image of our Sport in society.

We also made progress in improving the quality of our competitions. Many Regions organized excellent Level III matches - last year IPSC had over 750 Level III sanctioned matches and our World Shoots displayed very high standards of course design, safety procedures, and officiating. I want to thank all Range Officers, Match Directors and volunteers. Without you, IPSC cannot function. Your work is often invisible, but it is absolutely essential.

Cooperation inside the IPSC structure remains very important. This year we had many discussions with Regional Directors and IPSC Committees. Even when we have different opinions, we always find solutions through respect and logic. This spirit of teamwork is one of the reasons IPSC continues to grow. Thank you for your trust and your professional work.

Technology development also continues. The IPSC Electronic Scoring System becomes better step by step. Match registration, classification and documentation are now both faster and more transparent than before.

Safety and education

Safety remains our highest priority. All our Instructors, Range Officers and Athletes must remember this. Clear range commands, proper muzzle control and responsible equipment handling are part of our identity. When people from outside look at IPSC, they must see a disciplined and safe community. Education is also essential for the future. Modern Athletes need not only good technical shooting skills, but also an understanding of rules, equipment and sportsmanship. I am happy that many Regions already organize seminars and training programs. This systematic approach to education helps us prepare better and more responsible Athletes.

MISIA programs

I also want to mention the MISIA programs. They give Regions a useful framework for training Instructors and creating unified teaching standards. They help us maintain consistent quality and safety around the world. I will report about the MISIA program in more detail later during the Assembly.

Future goals

I would like to mention one of our long-term goals. We will continue preparing IPSC for Olympic recognition in the future. It is a complex process and will not happen quickly. However, we are continuing to build strong governance, safe and fair competitions, anti-doping compliance and youth programs. For this, we need unity among all Regions and clear communication within the Confederation.

Looking ahead, our priorities remain consistent, being to:

- develop and support all IPSC Disciplines;
- continue the education and training of Range Officers, Instructors, and Athletes;
- strengthen safety culture everywhere;
- support programs for juniors and ladies;
- keep IPSC as a sport of fairness, respect, and friendship.

I am confident that our future is bright. IPSC today is not only a sport — it is a true international community. Together we will continue to raise the level of our competitions and show the world what a responsible and dynamic shooting sport looks like.
